

St James' C. of E. Primary School, Birch- in- Rusholme, Manchester M14 6HW

Admission Policy 2020/2021

St James' is situated in the Diocese of Manchester and is maintained by Manchester Education Authority. As a Voluntary Aided school, the Governing Body is the Admissions Authority and is responsible for taking decisions on applications for admissions to the school.

For the school year commencing September 2020 the admission number is 30.

Admission to the school will be made by the Governing body in accordance with the stated parental preference, subject to the following set of admissions criteria forming a priority order where there are more applications for admission than the school has places available.

The governors will admit all children having a statement of special educational needs or an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) in which the school is named. In the event of oversubscription for the remaining places they will be allocated by the following criteria applied in order.

Admissions Criteria

1. Looked After Children and Previously Looked After Children.
2. Children whose medical or social circumstances mean that their needs can only be met at this school.
3. Children who have an older sibling at St James' Primary School who will still be at the school at the time of admission.
4. Children of staff at the school, where staff have been in employment at the school for at least two years.
5. Children whose parent(s)/carer(s) regularly attend public worship at the Church of the Holy Innocents, Fallowfield.
6. Children whose parent(s)/carer(s) live within the boundaries of the parish of Birch with Fallowfield and regularly attend another Christian place of worship that is a member of Churches Together in Britain and Ireland.
7. Children whose parent(s)/carer(s) live within the boundaries of the parish of Birch with Fallowfield and regularly attend a place of worship of another faith tradition (eg mosque, synagogue) that is a member of the Inter Faith Network.
8. Children whose parents/carers live within the boundaries of the parish of Birch with Fallowfield.
9. Other children living within Manchester whose parent(s)/carer(s) regularly attend another Christian place of worship that is a member of Churches Together in Britain and Ireland or regularly attend a place of worship of another faith tradition (eg mosque, synagogue) that is a member of the Inter Faith Network.
10. Other children

Notes

- a. All applicants will be considered at the same time and after the closing date for admissions. Claims made on the application form will be verified.
- b. Where there are more applicants for the available places within a category, then distance to the child's normal home front door from the main gate of the school in a straight line measured on a map will be used as the final determining factor, nearer addresses having priority over more distant ones. The 'normal' home of the child will be taken to be the home in which the child sleeps for the majority of the school week.
- c. Where admission is sought under exceptional medical or social circumstances criteria, professional supporting evidence, e.g. from a doctor, psychologist or social worker, is essential. Such evidence must set out the particular reasons why the school is the most suitable for the child and the difficulties that would be caused if the child had to attend another school.

Definitions

- 1 The term sibling includes half or full brother/sister, adoptive brother/sister, step brother/sister, half brother/sister, foster brother/sister and adopted brothers or sisters living at the same address and full brother or sister living apart.
- 2 Regular attendance means a minimum of monthly attendance at Church/Synagogue/Mosque at public worship for at least the year prior to 1st September in the year before admission to the school. - 3 Parent/carer shall also mean legal guardian.
- 4 A "looked after child" is a child who is
(a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions at the time of making an application to a school. Previously looked after children are children who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order).

Tie-breaker

If the distance from home to school does not distinguish between two or more applicants with equal priority for the remaining place, random allocation will be used as the final tie-breaker. This will be supervised by someone independent of the school.

Children from multiple births

Where there are children of multiple births wishing to be admitted and the sibling (brother or sister) is offered the final place the governors may admit over the published admission number if it is possible to do so, as these children are permitted exceptions to the infant class size limit.

Applying for places

Applications must be made on the local authority's application form, which must be returned to the local authority by the closing date. Details of all the applications made will be forwarded to the school by the local authority.

In addition to the local authority form, please complete and return the school's Supplementary Information Form (SIF) if you wish your child to be considered for entry under the faith-based criteria (criteria 5, 6, 7 and 9) above.) The SIF should be returned to the school by the closing date for applications.

Late applications

Late applications for reception year will be considered only after all applications received before the closing dates have been determined. If places become available the above criteria will be applied to late applications and any undetermined appeals.

Casual In-Year Admissions

The above criteria will be applied if casual vacancies arise during the school year and there are more applicants than places.

Deferred entry

Children are entitled to a full time place in school in the September following their fourth birthday.

Once they have been offered a place at the school, the child's parents can defer the date their child is admitted to the school until later in the school year but not beyond the point at which they reach compulsory school age and not beyond the beginning of the final term of the school year for which the application was made.

Where parents wish, children may attend part-time until later in the school year but not beyond the point at which they reach compulsory school age.

Admission outside the child's normal age group

Parents may seek a place for their child outside of their normal age group, for example, if the child is gifted and talented or has experienced problems such as ill health. In addition, the parents of a summer born child may choose not to send that child to school until the September following their fifth birthday and may request that they are admitted out of their normal age group - to reception rather than Year 1.

Parents requesting admission out of the normal age group must put their request in writing, addressed to the Headteacher at the school, together with any supporting

evidence that the parent wishes to be taken into account. The Governing Body will make decisions on requests for admission outside the normal age group on the basis of the circumstances of each case and in the best interests of the child concerned. This will include taking account of the parent's views; any information provided about the child's academic, social and emotional development; where relevant, their medical history and the views of a medical professional; whether they have previously been educated out of their normal age group; and whether they may naturally have fallen into a lower age group if it were not for being born prematurely. The Governing Body will also take into account the views of the Headteacher. When informing a parent of their decision on the year group the child should be admitted to, the Governing Body will set out clearly the reasons for their decision.

Where the Governing Body agrees to a parent's request for their child to be admitted out of their normal age group and, as a consequence of that decision, the child will be admitted to a relevant age group (i.e. the age group to which pupils are normally admitted to the school) the local authority and Governing Body must process the application as part of the main admissions round, unless the parental request is made too late for this to be possible, and on the basis of their determined admission arrangements only, including the application of oversubscription criteria where applicable. The Governing Body must not give the application lower priority on the basis that the child is being admitted out of their normal age group.

Parents have a statutory right to appeal against the refusal of a place at a school for which they have applied. This right does not apply if they are offered a place at the school but it is not in their preferred age group.

Appeals

If your application for a place in this school is unsuccessful you have the right to appeal. If you receive notice that your application has been unsuccessful, a copy of the Appeals Procedure and Guidance will accompany it.

Waiting list

Where we have more applications than places, the oversubscription criteria will be used to determine the allocation of places. Children who are not admitted will have their name placed on a waiting list. The names on this waiting list will be in the order resulting from the application of the admissions criteria. Since the date of application is not one of the admissions criteria, it cannot be a criterion for the order of names on the waiting list, and late applicants for the school will be slotted into the order according to the extent to which they meet the criteria. Thus it is possible for a child who moves into the area later to have a higher priority than one who has been on the waiting list for some time. If a place becomes available within the admission number, the child whose name is at the top of the list will be offered a place. This is not dependent on whether an appeal has been submitted. This waiting list will operate until 31 December at the end of the autumn term following admissions in September.
